Loko i'a Pā'aiau Update June 2024

Grants

Mahalo nui loa to UH Sea Grant for awarding Pā'aiau a one-year \$19,000.00 grant entitled, "Spiritual Restoration of a Native Hawaiian Fishpond through the traditional healing practices of lā'au lapa'au, lomilomi, pule and the establisment of a Māla Lā'au Lapa'au to strengthen community relationships, uplift mo'olelo and deepen relationship to 'āina and the heavens."

The project is the brainchild of Kanani D'Angelo, Kellee Hearther, Keola Kalani, and Uncle Bruce Keaulani and will cultivate traditional healing plants which wlll be shared with the community. Two high school interns will receive stipends to assist with the project.

It is projected to be begin in the coming month, and we welcome all to participate.

• We have been selected for second round consideration of Department of Interior Kapapahuliau Climate Resilience Grants " to enhance the ability of the Native Hawaiian Community to navigate the effects of climate change in ways that maintain the integrity and identity of the Native Hawaiian people while also maintaining and enhancing their capacity for coping, adaptation, and transformation." The project will support climate resilience through Native Hawaiian contemplative and healing practices. If awarded, the one-year grant will support a cohort of Native Hawaiian physician fellows and will assist them in creating content to address the impact of climate change on health and wellbeing and to cultivate traditional resilience practices.
